Awards: One Thousand Dollars and Premiere at the 2025 International Delta Omicron Conference

Purpose To encourage composers To give their work public performances To further the cause of contemporary music

Rules

Eligibility: This competition is open to COMPOSERS of college age or over. This is regardless of any music fraternity affiliation.

Music Requirements: The composition should be for Clarinet and Piano. The length of time should be from seven to fifteen minutes. Manuscripts should be LEGIBLY written in ink or processed, signed with nom de plume, and free from any marks that would identify the composer to the judges.

Submission Requirements: To be eligible, the composition shall not have been previously commissioned, published or publicly performed (except for feedback) prior to the time that judging is completed in the summer of 2017. To be eligible for the award, the winner of the competition must wait to publish her/ his work until after the première performance in July 2018. Each entry should be accompanied by an envelope with the pseudonym written on the outside. The envelope should contain the entrant's name, address, phone number, email address, and entry check. This is only for the use of the Competition Chair and will not be shared with the judges. If more than one composition is entered, each entry should be sent separately and should abide by the rules set for an entry.

All entries must be digital and received no later than march 31, 2024. An entry fee of \$25.00 (American money) should accompany each manuscript. Checks should be made out to Delta Omicron. This fee is to cover postage, insurance and handling cost to and from each of the judges. Please note: once a manuscript is submitted, there will be no refund of the entry fee if the entrant chooses to withdraw from the competition. Entries will not be returned.

Due care will be used in protecting all manuscripts received, but each applicant specifically releases all persons, judges and Delta Omicron from any and all claims and damages arising out of loss or destruction of submitted composition, however caused.

Awards: The awards shall be \$1,000 and the Première Performance at the 2025 Delta Omicron International Fraternity's Triennial Conference. The monetary award is underwritten in part by the Delta Omicron Foundation, Inc. The composer is encouraged to attend the Première Performance of her/his composition at the 2025Triennial Conference. All expenses to the Conference are the responsibility of the composer.

The decision of the judges will be FINAL. The prize will be withheld, if in the opinion of the judges, none of the compositions submitted is of a caliber warranting an award.

Miscellaneous: All of the above rules shall be followed, or the composition will be disqualified.

Delta Omicrons are an appreciative and warm audience. They love whatever you put before them, be it a complete concerto or a comic art song. We heard a wide range of wonderful performances at conference. Here are the conference performers.

Alumni Performers

Elisabeth Williams (she/her) made her international operatic debut as Donna Elvira in the Vocal Academy of Orvieto's production of Don Giovanni in Bodrum, Turkey in 2021. Elisabeth spent her summer performing the role of Fiordiligi in Opera in the Ozark's production of "Così fan tutte." In 2021 Elisabeth debuted at University of North Texas Opera as Euridice in Gluck's Orfeo ed Euridice, followed by the role of Mařenka in Smetana's "The Bartered Bride." Previous operatic roles include Cinderella (Cendrillon) and Angelina (Trial by Jury) with Illinois Wesleyan University's Opera Theater. Elisabeth won Illinois Wesleyan's 2019 Concerto Aria Competition. Elisabeth has soloed in Italy, South Africa, Poland, Canada, and Japan. In the spring of 2022, Elisabeth graduated with her Master of Music from the University of North Texas under the tutelage of Professor Molly Fillmore. Elisabeth graduated Summa Cum Laude with her Bachelor of Music from Illinois Wesleyan University, learning under Dr. William Hudson. Elisabeth is headed to William Jewell College to pursue her Artist Diploma in Voice.

Cameron Richards was a member of the Omicron Omicron chapter of Delta Omicron at Western Kentucky University. He double majored in Music Education and Biology. While in the Omicron Omicron chapter, he served as chapter secretary for two years, chapter president for a year, and as chapter delegate to the 2018 Triennial Conference.

After graduating he took a job teaching middle school band and STEM in Bardstown, Kentucky. He is currently working towards his PhD at the University of Kentucky.

Ginger Hedrick is a classical flutist and avid performer of orchestral and chamber music. She has performed with the Boulder Chamber Orchestra, Boulder Symphony, Stratus Chamber Orchestra, Denver Philharmonic as well as Chamber Ensemble con Grazia, and Coffee Quintet. Ginger has toured with orchestras to England, Scotland, Italy, Czech Republic and China. She holds a BS degree in Music Education from the University of Illinois School of Music, and is a proud member of Zeta Zeta chapter of Delta Omicron.

Grace Asquith is a freelance pianist in the Boulder/Denver area. She is co-founder and Artistic Director of Chamber Ensemble con Grazia, now in its 14th season, taking special delight in working with a variety of instrumentalists and singers. In particular CEG promotes new composers by premiering works by John Fuerst, Karl Kroeger, John White, and K. D. Mueller. As a founding member of the Rocky Mountain Composers, she wrote Spectrum, A Suite for Flutes, for flutists Ginger Hedrick and Chris Potter. Throughout the seven movements all sizes from piccolo to bass flute are featured in various combinations. She has been a member of Denver's Zeta Zeta chapter since 1987.

Collegiate Performers

Noah Gipson is a senior music education major at Jacksonville State University in Alabama with trombone and voice as his primary and secondary instruments respectively. He studies trombone with Dr. Casey Thomas and voice with Dr. Nathan Wight. Noah was initiated into the Delta Omega chapter in spring 2019. Since then he has served as Director of Publicity and Director of Musical Activities. Outside of D.O., Noah participates in many ensembles at JSU: A Cappella Choir, Chamber Singers, Symphonic Band, and the Marching Southerners,



marching in both the trombone and color guard sections. He also serves as chaplain and a founding father of the Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity. He participated in Divenire Winterguard in Birmingham in 2020 and 2021, World Games Color Guard in 2022, and is a UKirk singer at First Presbyterian Church of Jacksonville. Noah is thrilled to be a music delegate at Triennial and hopes to make many memories with D.O.s all around.

Cassie Case is an undergraduate student at Jacksonville State University majoring in euphonium. She is excited for graduation in the spring of 2023. World Premiere of "Night Songs III"

Conference attendees were delighted to witness the world premiere of "Night Song III," the winning composition.

Night Songs III

Following "Night Songs" (2002) and "This Shining Night (Night Songs II)" (2013), this set of six songs again explores the theme of the night and our relationship with the nocturnal hours.

The texts are by Gerard Manley Hopkins, Francis Quarles, Ada Cambridge, William Bliss Carman and two from Walt Whitman.

Hopkins' sonnet "The Starlight Night" describes the importance of looking at the stars and appreciating God's creation in one's everyday life. The voice in the poem implores the reader to look up at the sky and observe the stars closely, even if they are often taken for granted.

Quarles' poem "A Good Night" is a lullaby, and suggests that even the concerns of kings become nothing when sleep beckons. Although English by birth, Cambridge spent much of her life in Australia, writing poems and novels moving from religious and romantic subjects to more radical ones that increasingly showed a feminist perspective on life. Her poem "What of the Night" is descriptive of a range of things one might see or hear at night, before the arrival of dawn.

Carman was Canadian born but spent much of his living as a writer and editor in the United States. Carman's "The Heart of Night" focuses on the stars and talks of how we observe them with "speechless awe," and how the majesty of nature makes humanity seem small by comparison.

The final two poems are both by Walt Whitman. The brief "Look Down, Fair Moon" asks the moon to shine its light on a rather ghastly scene below - the poem refers to "the dead, on their backs, with their arms toss'd wide..." The reference is likely to be to the American Civil War, where bodies were often left uncollected on the battlefields for days. "A Clear Midnight" also ends the previous two volumes of "Night Songs" - each time set differently as a kind of personal test of how one might set a poem multiple times in different ways! This poem uses metaphor to describe the transition from an earthly corporeal life, to a spiritual one. It may also be seen as a poem to comfort those who are left behind when someone dies. The final line beautifully sums up the themes of these song cycles: "night, sleep, death, and the stars."

New Zealand composer David Hamilton (b.1955) was head of music at Epsom Girls Grammar School until the end of 2001 where he conducted the award-winning girls choir Opus.

He was Deputy Music Director of Auckland Choral (1996-2011). He has been Composer-in-Residence with the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra (1999), and at both Sing Aotearoa (2013) and the NZ Singing School (2015). He concentrates on composing while maintaining part-time involvement in music education as a composition tutor and choral conductor. He is well-known as a choral conductor, adjudicator, workshop leader, and clinician.

His choral music is widely performed, and is published in the U.K., U.S.A., Germany, and Finland. Works have been commissioned by choirs in Japan, England, U.S.A., Finland, Ireland, and Australia. He has won composer competitions in Italy (2000) and the U.S.A. (2005, 2006 and 2007), New Zealand (2007) and the U.K. (2008). In 2007 "Hine Raukatauri," a concerto for flute and chamber orchestra, took first prize in the Haifa International Composers Competition (Israel), and in 2014 "Wairua" for solo harp took first place in the New Zealand Harp Society's competition.

In 2016 "American Triptych" took first place in a competition for the Stockton Chorale (U.S.A.). In 2017 "Are We There Yet?" for viola ensemble took first place in the Australia and New Zealand Viola Society composer's competition, and "Cling to Me" was placed third in the 4th Komos Choral Composition Competition (Bologna, Italy). In 2018 he was awarded the SOUNZ Community Commission for a new work for youth groups in Taranaki. In 2019 "Electric" for chamber ensemble was a winner in the Atlanta Contemporary Ensemble's composer's contest.



The work was performed by Augusto Gil, past first vice president and Andrew Johnson, conference accompanist.

Augusto Gil hails from Blountville, Tennessee and frequently performs, accompanies, teaches, conducts and adjudicates throughout the southeastern United States. Gil earned his Bachelor of Music and certification in K-12 Music Education with double emphasis in voice and piano from Carson- Newman University. In 2018, he earned a Masterof Music degree in choral conducting at the University of South Carolina, where he studied with Drs. Larry Wyatt and Alicia W. Walker. He will begin work on the Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of South Carolina in the fall of 2022.

In his four and a half years as choral director at Meadow Glen Middle School in Lexington, South Carolina, he more than doubled participation in the choral program, and established the first cross-disciplinary celebration of Heritage Months in Lexington County schools. He serves as assistant director of music and worship at Eastminster Presbyterian Church of Columbia and is the owner and operator of Improving Arts Academy, a private instruction and coaching studio for voice and piano students.

He currently lives in West Columbia, South Carolina with his husband, John Michael, and their dogs, Rose, Apollo, and Tommy. When not creatively focused on music and performance, he enjoys playing board games and traveling.

As an organist, pianist, vocalist, composer, and conductor, *Andrew Johnson* plans to one day teach and inspire the next generation of performers, academics, and church musicians. Andrew holds the Master of Music in organ performance from the Peabody Conservatory of The Johns Hopkins University, where he received the Bruce R. Eicher Prize in Organ. He is currently pursuing Peabody's graduate performance diploma, continuing his studies with Dr. Daniel Aune and maintaining his post as graduate assistant in ear training.

Before moving to Baltimore, he graduated summa cum laude with the Bachelor of Music from Illinois Wesleyan University, where his primary teachers were Dr. Susan Klotzbach for organ and Dr. J. Scott Ferguson for voice and choral conducting. He served as accompanist and assistant conductor for the University Choir and as bass section leader of the IWU Collegiate Choir. The music faculty named him "Presser Scholar" and in 2020 he received the designation of Research Honors in Music for his paper on an organ mass by Jean Langlais, Suite Médiévale: A Guide for Interpretation and Performance. His research for this project began when he participated in Peabody's organ tour of Paris, during which he studied privately with Marie-Louise Langlais.

Johnson currently serves as organist and choirmaster at Mount Calvary Catholic Church in Baltimore, Maryland. An active member of the American Guild of Organists, he serves on the National Committee for Career Development and Support and holds the guild's Associate certification. His research has been published in The American Organist magazine and his arrangements are published in the Delta Omicron Songbook.

Conference attendees also enjoyed the world premiere of the Foundation's Thor Johnson Memorial Commission, "Evolving Reflections" by J. Ryan Garber. After the performance Drs. Garber and Scruggs were inducted as National Patrons of Delta Omicron.

The first movement of "Evolving Reflections" is dedicated to Ann Anthony Jones, a past international president and ardent supporter of Delta Omicron. The title "A calm hustle, no matter the chaos," is how the composer perceives Ann. The second movement, "2019," was composed in memory of Angela Holder, one of three friends who died suddenly during that year. Part of this movement is based on a setting of Psalm 23 that Ryan Garber and Angela performed together. "Unseen Friends" is dedicated to a Canadian jazz saxophonist that Garber has known for over ten years. They had many conversations about music but never met in person. The fourth movement bears no dedication, though it is a calm and reflective foreshadowing of the final movement. It serves a practical purpose of "Resting Old Chops." The final movement "Ein Eingespieltes Team" is dedicated to Richard J. Scruggs. He and the composer have performed as the *Duo parabolique* et d'ivoire (Garber-Scruggs Duo) since 2004. The overall title of the composition comes from a newspaper article about one of their performances in Germany.

Composer *J. Ryan Garber's* music has been performed in a variety of venues in the United States and Europe. He has received awards, recognition, and special performances from five national organizations and was named "Composer of the Year" by the Tennessee Music Teachers Association in 2002. His music has been released on the Bella Musica, Vox Novus, ErmMedia, and Capstone labels.

Garber earned the B.M. and M.M. in music composition at James Madison University and the D.M. in music composition at the Florida State University. His principal teachers were John Hilliard and Ladislav Kubik. Additionally, Garber has benefited from individual insights on composing from, among others, Donald Erb, Libby Larsen, Nancy Van de Vate, and Ellen Taaffe Zwilich.

Duo parabolique et d'ivoire was founded in 2004 by composer/ pianist/ organist J. Ryan Garber and saxophonist Richard Scruggs. The genesis of their collaboration began with,naturally, a composition by Garber for Scruggs, Parabolisms, for saxophone and piano. It intrigued Garber that early saxophones were parabolic, not conical as modem ones, and composed a work exploring unique aspects of the sound and expressive possibilities of these instruments. The idea was born to explore new musical aspects of this combination through performances of both established and newer works in the saxophone and piano repertoire.

J. Ryan Garber has performed in a variety of recital and concert venues as a pianist, organist, and bassoonist. Currently organist/choirmaster and composer-in-residence at All Saints' Episcopal Church (Morristown, Tennessee), he also teaches music courses at Walters State Community College. Previously he taught music composition/theory, organ, and bassoon at Carson-Newman University for eight years, where he was an associate professor and recipient of the excellence in teaching/leadership and creativity awards.

As a composer he has received recognition from multiple organizations including the "Composer of the Year" award from the Tennessee Music Teachers Association. Garber's music covers most genres and is performed regularly in the U.S. and Europe. His composition, "Another Twist," was written for the eminent baritone saxophonist Linda Bangs, who recorded it on the Bella Musical Antes label.



Richard Scruggs has performed widely in America, Germany, Sweden, Poland, and the Netherlands as soloist and chamber musician in concert venues and festivals such as Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall (New York City), the Alte Oper (Frankfurt), Sophiensaal (Munich), the Internationale-Ferienkurse flir Neue Musik (Darmstadt), and the Festival der Seltenen Besetzungen (Ludwigsburg).

Several gifted composers have dedicated saxophone works to Scruggs, including Werner Wolf Glaser, Cristian Marina, Ryan Garber, Mark Alan Taggart, Alan Theisen, and Michael Sidney Timpson.

He was for several years a student of the eminent saxophone soloist and pedagogue Sigurd Rascher and in 1992 earned the Doctor of Music degree from Florida State University. From 1993 to 2001 he was the saxophone instructor of the Tübinger Musikschule in Germany. He is currently an associate professor of music at Carson-Newman University in Jefferson City, Tennessee.

Scruggs plays a parabolic saxophone built in 1927 according to the original acoustical design of the inventor, Adolphe Sax.

Guest Artist Concert Friday evening at conference had attendees riveted to their seats. Both performers were inducted as National Patrons of Delta Omicron following their performance.

Sergeant Major Troy McKay grew up in Richmond, Missouri. It was this experience that inspired him to serve his country through music. In 1997 he earned a bachelor's degree in music education at Illinois State University, studying trumpet with Dr. Amy Gilreath, and in 1998 he earned a master's degree in trumpet performance as part of the last studio of Vincent Cichowicz. McKay began his military career in 1998 as a bugler with the Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps, and he has played trumpet with The U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own" since joining the Ceremonial Band in 2001. In 2003, McKay joined the Concert Band, where he continues to serve as a trumpet player and the Senior Producer. Prior to joining the Army, McKay performed throughout the United States, Europe, and Russia, most notably with the New Sigmund Romberg Orchestra, the American Russian Youth Orchestra, and the Orchestra of the World. As a member of "Pershing's Own," McKay has performed with the Concert Band in China, Norway, and our nation's most prestigious concert halls such as the Kennedy Center, Kimmel Center, and the Lincoln Center. He has been a featured soloist with the band on tour as well as in our nation's capital. As an active conductor and educator, McKay has taught at Washington Bible College, and he currently serves as the Music Director for First Baptist Church of Waldorf, where he conducts both choir and orchestra. McKay resides in LaPlata, MD with his wife Lucile and their four sons.

Born on Long Island, New York, and raised in Connecticut, Sergeant First Class Dan Campolieta began studying piano at an early age and began playing the organ in middle school. He attended the University of Connecticut where he graduated in 2008 with bachelor's degrees in both Organ Performance and Music Education. In 2007, Campolieta began his eight-year tenure as Organist and Associate Music Director at Asylum Hill Congregational Church in Hartford, Connecticut, a large, musically active, mainline Protestant church. During that time, he was also in demand as an accompanist, chamber musician, and jazz pianist in the Hartford area. In 2015, he won his position in The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own" as pianist with The U.S. Army Chorus. Campolieta's musical interests range from performances of historically informed early music to that of the most avant-garde composers...and everything in between. A lover of new music, Campolieta has premiered works by Morten Lauridsen, Steven Sametz, and jazz bassist Rufus Reid.A published composer himself, Campolieta's first CD, Guided Imagery, was released in 2012. He appears as a sideman or arranger on several other recording projects across many musical genres. He has performed solo organ recitals in several notable venues, including the Wanamaker Organ in Philadelphia and the West Point Cadel Chapel. In his spare time, he enjoys running and obstacle course racing. Campolieta lives in Alexandria, Virginia, with his wife, Christen, a singer and choral director.
