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
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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Delta Omicron,

Iona Loch Siegel died on March 26, 2018 in her home surrounded by family. Known fondly as "Io," she was born on February 1, 1937 in Pitcairn, Pennsylvania, the third of four children to the Reverend Howard F. and Esther R. Loch. She grew up in Kittanning, Pennsylvania with her brothers Charles (deceased) and Merle, and her sister Carolyn (Allen). A graduate of Kittanning High School, she had an immense love of music and earned a Bachelor of Science in Music Education at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. She was initiated into the Delta Sigma chapter of Delta Omicron on May 1, 1956. Married by her father in a joint wedding with her sister, she and her husband Richard "Dick" Siegel settled in New



Providence, New Jersey and lived there for 48 years raising four children. She taught both vocal and instrumental music in Bellevue, Pennsylvania and New Providence, New Jersey. Never happy to sit still, she went back to the Bank Street College of Education and earned a Master of Science in Education in Early Childhood Leadership. She was the Nursery School Director of Education at Westfield Presbyterian Nursery School and Kindergarten, New Jersey for 14 years before retiring to E. Harwich, Massachusetts in 2008.

She is survived by Richard, her loving husband of 57 years, her children Brian, Holli, Trent, Leigh, two sons-in-law, a daughter-in-law, and eight grandchildren.

A service to celebrate Iona's life took place at the First Congregational Church in Harwich, Massachusetts, on April 7th at 2pm. Delta Omicron member Norma Murdock Hornick has died at 68. Norma lived in Ohioville, Pennsylvania and passed away July 2, 2018 surrounded by her family at Allegheny General Hospital in Pittsburgh. She was born July 17, 1949 in McKeesport, a daughter of the late Daniel T. and Martha Murdock. An Industry, Pennsylvania resident for 44 years, Norma was a 1971 graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania and initiated into the Delta Sigma chapter on April 1st, 1970. She later received her Master's Degree in Music Education. She taught elementary music in the South Side School District for 22 years before her retirement in 2010. She enjoyed teaching piano privately as well. She continued working as a K-5 elementary music teacher for 15 years after her ovarian cancer diagnosis because she really loved teaching young children. She finally retired when she felt that her last chemotherapy regimen affected her singing voice. She said she loved being paid to sing and dance every day, but retired when she could no longer sing! Active in her community, Norma was a member of the Alpha Delta Kappa, a sorority

for active and retired teachers, a former Girl Scout and 4-H leader and served on the board of a non-profit organization called Cardz for Kidz, a charity providing inspirational cards for children in hospitals. In her spare time she could be found either at Seven Oaks County Club or the Calcutta YMCA where she loved to swim every day. Norma will be greatly missed by her beloved husband, Michael P. Hornick, Ohioville; daughter, Sally (Stanton) Anderson, Winnetka, Ill.; son, James (Jennifer) Hornick, Chicago, Ill.; one brother, Keith (Ianine) Murdock, Wintersville, Ohio; a sister, Diane (Delma) Hughes, Tallahassee, Fla.; and three grandchildren: Sadie, Sloane, and Stanton Anderson, Jr. In addition to her parents she was preceded in death by an infant son, Samuel. Helene Frances Grove Hayman died July 17, 2016, just days short of her 103rd birthday. She was born June 30, 1912. She was initiated into Upsilon chapter on March 1, 1932. She was a music teacher, school district music su-

pervisor, performer, and mentor. She is survived by a step-daughter, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. Her service was held in August at Trinity Presbyterian Church in Prescott, Arizona.

Gregoria Karides Suchy

Gregoria Karides Suchy, Professor Emeritus of Composition and Music Technology at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and member of Zeta Delta Alumni Chapter, passed away October 3, 2018 at the age of 94.

She was born November 14, 1923 in Milwaukee. She attended Girls Trades and Technical High and graduated from Milwaukee State Teachers College's Department of Music in 1945. The same year, she began teaching at MSTC (predecessor of UWM). She studied composition with Anthony Donato, Alexander Tcherepnin, Rudolph Ganz and Ralph Shapey. Her ballet score, Skins and Exposures, is thought to have been the first electronic music composition in the state of Wisconsin.

The recipient of numerous grants for composition, her musical output covers a variety of media and genres from solo/chamber music to pieces for orchestra and jazz band. Her works, many of which have received awards and prizes, have been performed and/or recorded by eminent artists and groups including the New York Contemporary Chamber Ensemble; the International Society of Contemporary Music; Society of Composers, Inc., Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra (American Composers Festival); and the National Association of Composers-USA. Often, her compositions revealed her Hellenic heritage, such Greek Rhapsody for orchestra that was featured at a concert in honor of the 2010 Boston Marathon.

Suchy was initiated into the Delta Eta chapter on November 1, 1944. She was an avid member and supporter of Delta Omicron, serving as an advisor to Delta Eta and working to keep the chapter alive during her tenure at UWM. She retained her membership and connection to the Zeta Delta alumni chapter until her death. She was a very talented and super D.O. She will be missed.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Professor Raymond William Suchy and her brother, Peter Karides. She is survived by her children: Dr. Jessica Ray Suchy-Pilalis (Labros E. Pilalis) of Camp Hill, Pennsylvania and Potsdam, New York; and Mara Ray (Mark Saigh) Suchy of Altadena, California; Yiayia of Ariana Rayne Heslen Saigh; and Alexia Gregoria Noura Saigh; a sisterin-law Toula Karides; nieces and nephews: Vivian Anton (Peter) Limberatos; Nicholas P. (JoAnne) Anton; Marlene Karides (Charles) Ego; and Steven (Julia Laschen)



Karides; and her godchildren: Alexander N. Anton and Glenn Fischbach. She is also survived by grandnieces, grandnephews, other relatives, and friends.

Her funeral service was on October 6, 2018 at Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church in Wauwatosa, Wisconsin. Burial was at Burial Pinelawn Memorial Park. Memorials can be sent to Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church or the UWM Gregoria Karides Suchy Scholarship Fund.



Gloria Rodriguez Kappel

Gloria Rodriguez Kappel, 103, died on December 3, 2018 at Highlands Health Center in Newcastle Place, Mequon, Wisconsin. Gloria was a long-time member of Zeta Delta and she

was initiated into Delta Epsilon chapter on December 1, 1937.

She was born February 6, 1915 to Lee and Bella Rodriguez and was a resident of Milwaukee and Clearwater, Florida. Gloria was a well-

known voice teacher at Wisconsin College of Music (now Wisconsin Conservatory of Music) and later at the University School of Milwaukee. She was a graduate of Lincoln High School, the Wisconsin College of Music, and Alverno College. She was a member of the MacDowell Club of Milwaukee and a longtime member of the Unitarian Church, where she sang in the choir and performed as a soloist for many years. She will be especially missed by her "girls," members of the Romany Singers. Known as the Victory Singers during World War II, the Romany Singers was

a choir made up of selected voice students, founded and directed by Gloria. The group performed throughout the Midwest and were featured on a weekly, live TV show in the 1940s and '50s. She

also directed the Marquette Medical School Glee Club. Gloria made her singing debut as a lyric soprano at the Athenaeum of the Woman's Club of Wisconsin. She sang with the Wisconsin WPA Symphony Or-

chestra and performed with local musicians during her annual trips to Oaxaca, Mexico, one of her favorite places. Her voice students won numerous awards, and some went on to successful music careers of their own.

She was preceded in death by her parents, husband Edwin, and cousin Renee Cladwell. She is survived by other relatives and numerous friends. Her service was on January 26, 2019 in Mequon, Wisconsin and private interment was at Wisconsin Memorial Park. Memorials can be made to the music organization of your choice.

The History of Delta Omicron By, Michelle Worthing

It was the vision of one and the action of three that brought our beloved Delta Omicron Music Fraternity to life. Hazel Wilson (Bowsman), Mable Dunn (Hopkins) and Lorena Cramer (McClure) made history by being the only undergraduate students ever to form a national music sorority.

It only took a few days for them to organize their vision. Delta Omicron was the suggested name, the lyre for the badge, lily-of-the-valley the flower and the colors rose and gray. The pins were to be made ordered from a local jeweler - plain gold lyres with the Greek letters D and O outlined in black. Young women were selected for membership on a fellowship basis. And with this, Alpha Chapter of Delta Omicron was founded in room 224 at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, on September 6, 1909. Delta Omicron was incorporated on December 13, 1909, in the State of Ohio.

Their first pledge was Mae Chenoweth Grannis. The first constitution was drawn up by a Cincinnati lawyer. The creed was taken from a framed copy of "The Creed" by Phillip Brooks. National member No. 10, Ethel Cox wrote the words of The Prayer of Delta Omicron and Edwyl Redding wrote the music. Rituals were hand written and the cover was water-colored by Mabel.



Beta Chapter (Detroit Institute of Musical Art) and Gamma Chapter (Southern Seminary) formed in 1911, followed by Delta Chapter (Denison University) in 1915.

In June 1915 Volume 1, Number 1 of *The Wheel* was published.

The constitution was amended in 1917 to offer honorary membership to women musicians of national reputation. In 1920, at our first national convention, our open motto "Continually striving, we attain" was suggested by Lenore Harpster Lutz, then National President. Our coat of arms was also designed at this convention.



OUR BADGES, PINS AND JEWELRY



The Delta Omicron official badge is the Lyre of Gold. As noted above, our three founders went to Downtown Cincinnati to find a jeweler to make the first badges – the Oskamp Jewelry Company. They paid for these from their allowances.

After the first convention, George Steward in Granville, Ohio designed a heavier badge. The plain badges sold for \$2.00 each and the jeweled badges, with pearls, were \$4.00 each. The D.L. Auld Company of Columbus, Ohio became our official jeweler in 1918. Guards indicating chapters were available. Burr, Patterson and Company merged with Auld Company in 1925. In 2007, Burr, Patterson and Auld merged with Herff Jones, who has continued to be our official jeweler.

Pledge pins were designed in 1917, replacing the rose and gray ribbons pledges had worn.



Mabel Dunn Hopkins' badge was presented to the fraternity on Mabel's death with a request that it continue to be worn. It was set in a golden wreath of honor and has been worn by each president since. Past presidents were given a jeweled badge of Delta Omicron, set in a wreath of gold. Diamonds replaced three of the pearls symbolizing

our three founders. The original guard, a small jeweled Alpha, set on a stick-pin is attached. Later the president's own badge was used in the center of the wreath with a jeweled gavel as a guard.

The 1920 convention directed that a Coat of Arms be designed for Delta Omicron by Burr, Patterson & Auld. The first Coat of Arms was submitted to the 1931 convention. Our Delta Omicron Coat of Arms, or Crest is used in many ways.

It is mounted on a gold charm or pin for our chapter Patrons and Patronesses. It appears on the recognition pin, presented to both members and non-members in recognition of outstanding service to the Fraternity. It is presented to National Patrons in the form of a key. The Coat of Arms is printed on the cover of The Wheel. (See "Fraternity Trademarks" in this issue for an image.)

In 1951 the Star of Delta Omicron, a small gold star set with a single pearl, was created as an award to recognize outstanding service to the chapter, the Fraternity, school or community.



The Senior Honor Pin dates from 1931, but began in 1925 as an official honor pendant given to seniors receiving an artist diploma or its equivalent. Today it is presented to seniors with the highest cumulative average for 3 years, provided

that average is a B or above.

The "25" and "50" Year Pins were first presented at the Golden Anniversary conference in 1959. The silver 25 year pin is a spray of lily-of-the-valley with "25" at the base and was presented to members with 25 or more years of membership. A gold pin with "50" at the base was presented to members of the first chapter.

The Wheel Pin is the highest honor given to a fraternity member by the Board of Directors, in recognition of exemplary service to the Fraternity. This award has been given to only six members of the Fraternity. They are: Meredith Dugan Schoenfeld (1987), Ann Jones (1987), Jane Kuckuk (2000), Dorothy (Dottie) Bushing (2006), Michelle (Miki) Worthing (2009) and Jonny Ramsey (2017).

OUR RITUAL, CREED AND MOTTO

The original ritual is preserved in our national archives. It was completed in 1910. The booklet was designed and the cover hand painted in watercolors by Mabel Dunn. The ceremony was penned by Lorena Creamer, who prepared a new booklet for each chapter as needed. Our ritual music was written by Jeanellen McKee in 1953.

The Delta Omicron Creed was taken from a framed copy of "The Creed" by Phillip Brooks, which Adah Appel, Alpha chapter member, had hanging in her room.

Our open motto is "continually striving, we attain." It was suggested by Lenore Harpster Lutz, Epsilon chapter, and was adopted at the Cincinnati convention in April 1920.

OUR PUBLICATIONS

The first issue of our official publication, The Wheel of Delta Omicron, was published in June, 1915. It contained editorials, chapter letters and alumni notes, reports of the convention, notes of ritual changes, short musical notes and a message from the president. The name, *The Wheel*, was suggested by Constance Cheney Cox of Delta chapter. She felt that the wheel was a symbol of progress and it was a valuable symbol for Delta Omicron, for progress in music, in service and in continuing fellowship among music students and alumni. She pictured Alpha chapter as the hub of the wheel, the chapters representing the spokes and the rim holding the wheel together with the bonds of national interests. Today the hub still represents our founders and founding chapters. The spokes represent chapters, membership, fraternity organization, insignia, publications, professional relations, opportunities and national projects, all held together by the rim, the encircling bond of music. The Wheel was originally published once a year, eventually going to four issues a year. It is now published electronically on the D.O. website.

The Whistle is our national alumni-at-large newsletter and contains news for alumnae members who are not able to join alumni chapters and clubs. The name "Whistle" was suggested by Mae Chenoweth Grannis in 1909. Mae thought the name would suggest "whistling our far flung members back into the fold." It began as an annual publication,

became a seasonal journal, but now is now published yearly on our Delta Omicron website.

Our first Delta Omicron songbook was published in 1918, compiled by Bess Hagmeirer and Dorothy Swartz Babb, both of Delta Chapter. It contained original music and words, as well as familiar songs. It was updated by Dottie Bushing in 2003, using Finale music notation software. Our latest edition was edited by Elizabeth Rusch Fetters in 2016 using Sibelius software.

OUR EXECUTIVE OFFICE

The Delta Omicron executive office is located in Jefferson City, Tennessee. Our first office was formed in 1943 at the Wisconsin College of Music. At that time the office consisted of a notebook, a typewriter and a set of files. As Delta Omicron grew, so did our office and our current office opened in 2000. Besides being the hub of our official business, the president's files and historian archives are now located there.

OUR SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS

Every year grants are awarded to both collegiate and alumni chapters, by the Board of Directors, on a rotating sequence. These awards are to be used for a philanthropic purpose of the chapter.

The Board of Directors began awarding summer scholarships in 1966. Members can apply for one of several scholarships given in voice, opera, music theory, strings and other areas.

The Triennial Composition Competition began with awards given to members at a national conference. In 1946 it became "triennial" to coincide with our national conferences. The Board of Directors sets the performance medium and selects the judges for each competition. In 2006 the competition was recognized with the Outstanding Program Award presented by the Professional Fraternity Association. The winner's composition is premiered at the conference.

OUR NATIONAL PROJECTS

Delta Omicron has many well known National Projects, the earliest

being the building of The Delta Omicron Studio at the MacDowell Colony in Peterborough, New Hampshire in 1928. An endowment fund was established in 1927 to fund scholarships and awards. The Music Composers Library was begun in 1946 by Louise Contath Hoch. Its first purpose was the compilation of a list of both published and unpublished compositions by all D.O. members and patrons. In 1982 the library was moved to the Hamilton County Library in Cincinnati, Ohio and is open for general public use.

In 1994 Delta Omicron began a project entitled "Musician to Musician" Members donated their extra music and music books to be sent overseas.

Of special note, after World War II Delta Omicron helped to restock the bombed out Library of Lieges in Belgium, underwrote the on-tour expenses of the Aachen, Germany Symphony, donated a celeste to that orchestra, purchased coupons to send music kits overseas, and contributed music for blind students in Korea. Our philanthropy continues to this day.

OUR INTERNATIONAL CHAPTERS

With the installation of Kappa Alpha Chapter at Ewha Women's University in Seoul, Korea on June 7, 1958, Delta Omicron became the first music fraternity in the United States to become international. The person responsible for this expansion was Lenore Harpster Lutz, who served as our field representative to the Far East for many years.

OUR PATRONS AND PATRONESSES

The title of Patron or Patroness is conferred upon a musician who has attained a national reputation in his or her field. The title may also be conferred upon a nationally recognized patron of music. Our patrons include Mr. Rogers, Samuel Barber, Beverly Sills, Robert Shaw, Walt Disney, James Galway, Luciano Pavorotti, Eric Kunzel, Milton Babbitt, William Bolcom, Dan Forest, and John Rutter, to name just a few.

Honorary Members are those who have attained outstanding recognition in the field of music, such as Joanne Falletta and Frederica von Stade.

Both active and alumni chapters can induct patrons. Often they are faculty members or community members that are musicians, are interested in music and the purposes and objectives of Delta Omicron.

CITATIONS

Delta Omicron presents "citations" to individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the field of music as an educator, performer, composer, legislator, patron of the arts or entrepreneur. A citation may also be presented to companies and corporations that have promoted the cause and advancement of music throughout the United States and other parts of the world. Two examples are the "Save the Music Foundation" and "Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation."

THE DELTA OMICRON FOUNDATION

Roxine Beard Petzold, International President of Delta Omicron (1956-1962) recognized the need to have a separate division of the Fraternity that would be responsible for carrying out philanthropic business and projects, such as awarding scholarships and grants. The Delta Omicron Foundation received its charter from the State of Ohio in 1958, as a non-profit corporation. For over 60 years the Foundation

has served the philanthropic purposes of Delta Omicron. The purpose of the Foundation is to provide funds which support and promote music and musicians through educational grants for music study, composer commissions, awards for musical accomplishments, subsides for publications and programs promoting music in support of national music endeavors.

Trustees administer the Foundation. Scholarships are awarded annually to Delta Omicron members. In addition the Foundation supports American music and American composers through premier performances. The Foundation also commissions the Thor Johnson Memorial Commission each triennium, which is premiered at the triennial conferences, and underwrites the triennial Delta Omicron Fraternity Composition Competition.

Other projects supported by the Foundation include an annual Donation to the Metropolitan Opera Broadcast Fund, endowment of chairs at the Metropolitan Opera House, Lincoln Center in New York City, at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC. And at Carnegie Hall. The Foundation also makes yearly contributions for the maintenance fund of our studio at the MacDowell Colony.

Foundation membership is composed of members of the Past National Officers Club, also known as the PNOC, which began in the mid 70's.

THE MACDOWELL COLONY

The MacDowell Colony began with an old farm at Peterborough, New Hampshire. In a log cabin in the woods, composer Edward MacDowell did his ablest work. It was his hope that others in the arts might enjoy the same privileges of quietude and peace. Through the efforts of his wife, Mariam, the realization of his dream may be seen among the woods which now includes 450 acres and contains 32 studios.

The Delta Omicron studio at The MacDowell Colony was suggested by Irma DeVillers Earp from Alpha Chapter and was accepted at the 1925 convention. Ground was cleared for the studio in 1926 and a fund was established to maintain the studio in 1927. Each chapter pledged to pay part of the cost and the money was raised in only three years. Aaron Copland, Leonard Bernstein, Samuel Barber, and Stephen

Sondheim have all had residencies at The MacDowell Colony.

Each studio is an oasis by itself where each artist can work in seclusion. The MacDowell Colony is a unique institution – it is not a school or a camp. It is a place where artists may work to their best advantage.

The Foundation recently completed a campaign to help with the cost of a major renovation of our studio.

CONFERENCES

For many years Delta Omicron held annual conventions which were well attended and provided a source of inspiration to the chapters and individuals. The first convention was held at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music in April 1914, with delegates from Alpha, Beta, and Delta chapters. It was at the second convention held in Detroit in 1916 that an annual scholarship was instituted. Founders Day (Dec. 13) was designated at the 1923 convention. In 1944 our constitution was revised to hold conferences every three years.

Another change came at the 1977 conference, when delegates voted for Delta Omicron to open membership to include men.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The first National Officers of Delta Omicron were appointed in 1914. They were: Edna Sylvester, National President, Myriam Lutz (Blaker) National Secretary and Ruth Engle, National Treasurer. These officers had no duties until 1915, when our charter was granted, presented, and signed. This board was necessary because Delta Omicron was listed in the Sorority Handbook. The first active board members were: Lorena Creamer McClure, president, Maud E. Taylor, vice president, Allieret Chrysler (Morrow), treasurer, Marie Kegelmeyer, secretary, and Marion Rose Johnson, editor

This brief Delta Omicron history was taken from a presentation created for our triennial conferences. I always conclude with a quote from Lorena Creamer, taken from her presentation at the Golden Anniversary Conference in 1959:

"Let us not dwell on the past or on our past achievements. The goal has not been reached. If tribute must be paid the Founders, let it be by action."

Delta Omicron for Women and Men by, Dr. Kay Calfee Wideman

D.O. President, 1974-1980

Editor's note: Having both men and women in Delta Omicron is one of our greatest strengths. When I visited the Gamma Pi chapter I had the priveledge of meeting Tanya Lauser O'Brien, one of the charter members of the chapter. She told me that the reason she and her colleagues selected Delta Omicron was because Delta Omicron was co-ed. They are a small school and wanted a music fraternity that would appeal to everyone.

As the new Delta Omicron president in 1974, I had been told by the outgoing president, Adelaide Collyer, that there were some rumblings in the Professional Panhellenic Association of government mandates to change the memberships of honorary and professional fraternities to no longer allow single sex organizations. I didn't think much about these "rumblings" at the time but it soon became a big issue after I became president.



The Professional Panhellenic Association (PPA) was made up of representatives from fourteen professional fraternities for women including Delta Omicron. The Professional Interfraternity Conference (IFC) was the counterpart of PPA representing professional fraternities for men. Both organizations held annual conferences with the presidents of each fraternity attending.

In November of 1974, Senator Birch Bayh (Indiana) sponsored a bill to amend Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 to exempt certain fraternities and sororities from sex discrimination guidelines. That word "certain" came to mean both honorary and professional fraternities.

Social sororities and fraternities were not included in the "certain." We believed that the distinction between honorary and professional fraternities was not known to legislators. Honorary fraternities and sororities are generally just that. It was/is an honor to become a member with no particular activities required of the chapters. That, of course, was not, nor is the expectation for professional fraternities who have specific requirements for chapters. As such, professional fraternities formed an organization known as the Fraternal Alliance for Inalienable Rights (F.A.I.R.). Meetings were attended by professional fraternity presidents and efforts were made to clarify with the government the distinction between honorary and professional fraternities. It proved to be of no avail. If we did not open our memberships, colleges and universities where we had chapters for either men or women would have been threatened with losing federal funds. It was at that point that the Delta Omicron Board of Directors felt it had no choice but to open our membership to both women and men. So, at the 1977 triennial conference, Delta Omicron voted to move from being a professional fraternity for women to becoming a professional fraternity for both women and men. Some other professional fraternities did the same and a new organization, the Professional Fraternity Association (PFA), was formed combining members of both the PPA and IFC. (See also "History" at professional fraternity.org.)

It was a difficult change for Delta Omicron particularly for life members. But, as time has revealed, it was the best action to take. Delta Omicron has the best of both worlds. Some of our chapters have remained all women and others are composed predominately of men. In fact, our coed chapters have proven to be some of our strongest chapters and national leaders of both genders have emerged.



Fraternity Trademarks Protection of Our Fraternity Symbols

What emblems come to mind when you think about Delta Omicron? Is it the Greek letters, or our badge, or perhaps our Crest? Throughout the 110 years of Delta Omicron's existence, these have stood as symbols for our fraternity. But our use of these symbols to designate Delta Omicron and their use on fraternity merchandise, jewelry, and publications need protection. That protection comes through their trademarks. What is a trademark? What is the trademark history of each of our symbols? What are the fraternity policies related to trademarks?

What Is A Trademark?

A trademark is a word, symbol, or mark that represents a company, organization, or product that is established by continued use and is legally registered with the United State Patent and Trademark Office. Through continued use and registration, the trademark is a notice to the general public that the registrants have presumption of nationwide ownership, the legal exclusive right to use that symbol on its services and goods and can restrict its use by others. Fees are associated with initial registration, and trademarks must be renewed periodically with additional associated fees.



History of Our Trademarked Symbols

ΔO **Trademark:** The Greek letter combination of Delta and Omicron, first selected by Lorena Creamer McClure as the fraternity name in 1909, were first trademarked through the U.S. Patent Office on November 25, 1930. The application was made by National Secretary, Alma K. Wright. The trademark does not give the fraternity the right to use the Greek letters in total exclusivity but does allow their use on our products to represent our Fraternity's name on jewelry (such as the

Mother's Pin, Honorary Member Pins, and the Prospective Member Badges), on merchandise, and printed materials.

The Badge Trademark: The plain gold lyre with the letters D and O was selected by the three Founders as their first badge. Our history indicates that they found a local jeweler in town and ordered the pins to be designed, and until 1915 the lyres were handmade. A more commercial die-set badge was created by George Stewart of Granville, Ohio and advertised at



the first D.O Convention in 1915. At the 1918 convention, D.L. Auld Company established a new badge design set with pearls and became the official D.O. jeweler. The contract for jewelry passed to Burr, Patterson and Company in 1924 and then back to Auld Company in 1925. With the merging of the two companies in 1926, Burr, Patterson, and Auld maintained the design until 2007 when they merged with Herff Jones Company, the current fraternity jeweler.

The basic badge design (as pictured in this article) was first trademarked on September 2, 1969 for a twenty-year period. That registration lapsed without renewal, and application had to be filed again. The badge trademark was established again on December 28, 2010 through application by National Historian Jonny Ramsey.

The Crest Trademark: The 1920 Convention directed that a fraternity coat of arms be created using the Latin translation of the motto suggested by Lenore Harpster Lutz, "Continually striving, we attain." The project was completed by Burr, Patterson and Company with its first appearance being on a coat of arms plaque which is no longer available. In 1925, the "Crest," as it became to be called, also appeared on the Chapter Patron or



Patroness charm or pin. In 1926, it appeared on The Wheel cover in rose on gray paper. This became the standard Wheel publication cover style and is still in use today. The crest is used on official fraternity stationery, jewelry, and other official fraternity items.

The Crest was trademarked on June 17, 2014. The application for the crest trademark was initiated by National Historian Jonny Ramsey

and completed by Tamara Bennett, Trademark and Media Lawyer of Bennett Law of Lewisville, Texas. The first step was to secure the rights to the crest design since it was the design property of Herff Jones Company through its previous merging with Burr, Patterson, and Auld. Property rights were ceded to the Fraternity through a letter from Herff Jones and this letter is held in the fraternity historical files.

Part of the trademark application process required the description of the Crest in both original Heraldry language and in modern translation. Those descriptions are listed as follows:

Original Heraldry Style Description: Shield with a chevron, two mullets in chief and in base one mullet above two lances saltirewise. Crest: On a wreath encircled by sprays of laurel a Greek lyre proper, represented by the Delta Omicron badge, a lyre encrusted with pearls and a sash with the Greek letters delta and omicron. Below all, a motto Continenter Nitentes Consequirmur.

Full Descriptive Version: A bordered shield whose field is divided by a chevron, with two stars on the upper portion and one star under two saltirewise lances on the lower portion of the field. The shield crest is a Greek lyre represented by a Delta Omicron badge on a wreath of twisted cords and encircled by sprays of laurel. The badge is a lyre encrusted with pearls above and below a diagonal sash depicting the Greek letters delta and omicron. An unfurled scroll depicting the motto Continenter Nitentes Consequirmur rests below the shield.

Trademark Policy for Chapters and Members

Maintenance and continued ownership of trademarks requires oversight of their proper use and safeguard against potential unauthorized use. That is why in July of 2008, the Board of Directors approved the Protection of Fraternity Name and Symbols Policy in compliance with Bylaws Article V. That Article places legal representation for the Fraternity with the Board and the Triennial Conference. As part of that policy, individual Delta Omicron members "...do not have the authority to use the name of the Fraternity, its Crest, Greek letter trademark, or badge design on documents, online sites, or graphic designs without prior approval of the Triennial Conference or the Board of Directors in interim years." Those trademarked items are the

exclusive property of the national organization and can only be used by chapters, members, and non-members with specific permission from the Board or Triennial Conference. Members cannot *independently* enter into contractual agreements in the name of Delta Omicron, use its trademarked symbols for business transactional purposes, or use the symbols in created designs for display or sale. Chapters need to get preapproval from national for use of the symbols on chapter merchandise.

The Crest and the Badge designs are the most restricted symbols and are used primarily only on official fraternity merchandise. Use of the Crest on chapter websites is its most prominent use by chapters, but that particular use must be pre-approved by the Board. The Crest should not be used on personal websites, social media, or other sites. The badge design is restricted to national jewelry, so the design is highly restricted for that specific purpose.

In the past, the oversight and renewal of trademarks was handled by the National Historian. But with the increase to three trademarks rather than one and with the constant need to comply with applications renewals, the Board of Directors contracted with the Tamara Bennett Law Firm in Texas in 2013 to manage all trademark renewals and help with litigation if needed. That service continues today.

But protection of the marks is every member's responsibility, too. When wearing any of the symbols, be aware that you are representing the fraternity in action and deed. Be more aware of how and where your chapters are using the symbols. Seek permission for their use in compliance with fraternity policy as needed. Use and wear the symbols properly and proudly. They are our heritage from the Founders and the D.O.s who came before us.

Purposes

To encourage composers
To give their work public performance
To further the cause of contemporary music

Rules

ELIGIBILITY: This competition is open to COMPOSERS of college age or over. This is *regardless* of any music fraternity affiliation.

MUSIC REQUIREMENTS: The composition should be for Male Voice and Piano. The length of time should be from seven to fifteen minutes. Manuscripts should be LEGIBLY written in ink or processed, signed with *nom de plume*, and free from any marks that would identify the composer to the judges.

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS: To be eligible, the composition shall not have been previously commissioned, published or publicly performed (except for feedback) prior to the time that judging is completed in the summer of 2020. To be eligible for the award, the winner of the competition must wait to publish her/his work until after the première performance in July 2021. Each entry should be accompanied by an envelope with the pseudonym written on the outside. The envelope should contain the entrant's name, address, phone number, email address, and entry check. This is only for the use of the Competition Chair and will not be shared with the judges. If more than one composition is entered, each entry should be sent separately and should abide by the rules set for an entry.

ALL ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED NO LATER THAN MARCH 31, 2020. An entry fee of \$25.00 (American money) should accompany each manuscript. Checks should be made out to Delta Omicron. This fee is to cover postage, insurance and handling cost to and from each of the judges. Please note: once a manuscript is submitted, there will be no refund of the entry fee if the entrant chooses to withdraw from the competition. Entries will not be returned.

Due care will be used in protecting all manuscripts received, but each applicant specifically releases all persons, judges and Delta Omicron from any and all claims and damages arising out of loss or destruction of submitted composition, however caused.

THREE copies of each manuscript with CD recordings should be sent in a FLAT package by first-class mail. Upon receipt of the entry, the composer will receive an acknowledgment. *Music should not be spiral bound.*

AWARDS: The awards shall be \$1,000 and the Première Performance at the 2021 Delta Omicron International Fraternity's Triennial Conference. The monetary award is underwritten in part by the Delta Omicron Foundation, Inc. The composer is encouraged to attend the Première Performance of her/his composition at the 2021 Triennial Conference. 

Last year we hosted a Flute Choir Showcase with 6 visiting choirs playing separately, then joining together with a guest conductor as a grand finale.
